parade was American Heroes. Michael Majors, 7, in full climbing gear rescued a stuffed kitten for about a mile along the parade route.




Wolfforth Harvest Festival Parade

## Tree Of The Quarter

This quarter's tree, Arizona Oak, *Quercus arizonica* is found throughout central Mexico, in far west Texas and up into central Arizona. This tree is in the white oak group and very drought tolerant. With the concerns that we have about oak wilt and our diminishing water quality and quantity, we need to give more attention to some of the sometimes more obscure trees that are either native or adapted to our environment, even though they may not be readily available. Many of these trees could be brought in, but from the nurseryman's stand point, if people aren't buying these trees or even asking about them, why should he bring them in? You may have to go to more obscure nurseries such as Gunsight Mountain Nursery near Uvalde, Texas or Mountain States Nursery in Arizona.

Arizona Oak grows to 65' height with a trunk of up to 3' diameter in its native range. It is found primarily in canyons and on the rocky slopes near those canyons. In our landscapes, it will probably get to 50'.

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## Give Your Trees TLC

There are 13 essential nutrients that plants get from the soil, but that is by no means the end of the story. What form the element is in, how available the nutrient is, pH and organic matter in the soil are only some of the factors in how well a plant does. The Plant Health Care Program can give you peace of mind because a plant health care technician will make an assessment of the plants in your entire landscape on

a regular basis, checking for proper soil moisture, insect and disease and environmental damage. The technician will manage your irrigation system for you, changing the settings as the season changes. One of the most commonly found and most damaging problems in the urban landscape is over watering.

Soil management includes up to 4 applications per year of the proper nutrients and in useable forms.

Of course, no one wants a lot of weeds in their lawn. Tree Loving Care can help with controlling those weeds without harming your trees. Call 785-8733 today to schedule an appointment. Optimum weed control includes 3 applications of pre-emerge herbicide and it is best to begin these applications in the fall to control weeds that germinate in fall and early winter. We will also work with your lawn service to establish proper mowing heights.

Most trees are at about their heaviest in the fall. This can lead to broken limbs, especially if we get rain, snow or ice. Remember also

that God intended for leaves to be the insulating blanket for the winter. If you must rake your leaves, please bring them to TLC for composting instead of putting them in the dumpster. Of course, you can always call us to have one of our crews remove them for you. You will be surprised at how fast they disappear and we promise they won't go in the dumpster.

## Critters and Cruds

Kermes Scale should be hatching any day. This is a problem on Live Oaks and several species of Red Oaks. Eriococcus scale continues to be a problem and can be controlled most of the time with a soil treatment of Merit.

There are few insect and disease problems that exhibit themselves in the fall, but good root growth and proper nutrition in the fall is very important for good plant growth the rest of the year. TLC's fall fertilization satisfies these needs.

Remember all the fruit that you thought was such a nuisance ... Tree Loving Care can solve that problem by injecting Pischer, a plant hormone into your tree to cause the fruit not to set. This product needs to be applied in the fall for best results. This also gives a larger window of opportunity than spraying Florel and we don't have the problem of drift.
